18	I, JOHN IRWIN, declare:		
19	1. I am a sergeant in the Robinson Rancheria Police Department and a Bureau of		
20	Indian Affairs, Office of Justice Services federally commissioned law enforcement officer		
21	(Commission # 4652). I am submitting this declaration in support of Police Chief David		
22	Mendoza's opposition to the request for a restraining order and in support of his motion to quash, demurrer, and motion to dismiss filed in the above-entitled matter. The information contained in this declaration is based upon my own personal knowledge and, if called as a		
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	itness in these proceedings, I could competently testify thereto.		
26 27	2. On November 3, 2010, I was on duty, in uniform, and driving a marked black		
28	and white police radio squad car. I was on the Robinson Band of Pomo Indian's Reservation		
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I ("Reservation"), which is my primary jurisdiction area.

3. Police Chief Mendoza was also on duty and in uniform on that day. Chief
 Mendoza received a request for a civil standby from Anthony Duncan, the director of land
 management for the Robinson Environmental Center. This request was reviewed by Chief
 Mendoza and approved.

6 4. Chief Mendoza notified me of the request for civil standby. I contacted Duncan
7 at the Robinson Environmental Center at 11:20 a.m. I spoke with Duncan in his office. He
8 introduced me to a number of people who are Robinson Rancheria government employees, who
9 were there to conduct water well testing on all of the Robinson Rancheria properties. I was
10 informed by Duncan and other members of the testing crew that one of the water wells on the
11 Reservation is located next to a private property parcel owned by Gary Sabalone.

5. Duncan and the other members of the testing crew informed me that Sabalone
had caused issues for them in the past when they had tested the well next to his property. They
stated that, on one occasion, Sabalone closed and locked the gate after they had driven to the
well site and refused to allow them to leave. They further stated that, on another occasion,
Sabalone confronted them and brandished a firearm while they were in the course of their
duties testing the well.

6. I requested that Duncan show me the exact location of the well with respect to the property line of the private property in question. Duncan showed me a Lake County parcel map as well as a GPS boundary map. Both maps were certified by the County of Lake and the United States government. According to the maps, the well is close to the property line; it is, however, clearly on Reservation trust property. The maps also showed that the parcel owned by Sabalone is completely encompassed within the boundaries of the Reservation and that the easement road to his property is on Reservation trust property.

25 7. At that point, I asked the testing crew when they wanted to conduct their well
26 testing. We all agreed to start at 1:00 p.m.

8. At 1:00 p.m., I was met by Duncan and the testing crew. We drove to the
location of the well. At this location, there is a dirt road that begins from the Old Upper Lake

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Road and goes north approximately 140 yards to a chainlink gate. The gate was closed, but not
 locked. Duncan told me the gate was the private property boundary. On either side of the gate
 was an old dilapidated barbed wire fence. This fence ran parallel to the length of the dirt
 easement road and connected to the gate. This same fence line connected to the gate and went
 approximately another thirty yards to the north and ended in a drainage ditch.

9. Duncan showed me the location of the water well. The well was in an open
field. There was no fence line or obvious indication of the boundary of the private property line
adjacent to the well. I did see wooden stakes with ribbon attached and painted tops of fence
posts near the water well. Although these indicators were not a definitive boundary marking, I
believed they were a general indicator of the property line based on the parcel map I had
inspected earlier.

12 10. I directed Duncan and the testing crew to go around the fence line. They drove 13 their vehicles around the fence line and set up all of their equipment at the water well location. 14 I parked my squad car on the shoulder of the easement road and walked around the fence line to 15 the test location. The water test was scheduled to take approximately three hours. I stood by for 16 approximately two and a half hours without incident. From my location at the test site, I could 17 clearly see Sabalone's residence on top of the hill as well as vehicles parked at the residence.

18 11. At approximately 3:20 p.m., I received a call of a traffic collision on the Old 19 Lake County Road. The initial report was a single vehicle rollover, which was believed to be 20 on the Reservation. Because I had had no interaction with the property owner for over two 21 hours, I cleared from the civil standby and responded to the traffic accident. Chief Mendoza 22 also responded to the accident scene. The accident scene was just outside of the Reservation. 23 There were no injuries to the driver or passenger. I, therefore, returned to the water well location and continued to stand by. Chief Mendoza stood by the accident scene and waited for 24 the California Highway Patrol. 25

At approximately 4:00 p.m., the water well testing was still taking place. It was
necessary that I clear that location as I was going off duty. I called Chief Mendoza and
requested that he take over for me. I met Chief Mendoza at the Old Lake County Road at the

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intersection of the casement road. We drove the length of the road and stopped at the gate. We 1 2 were in separate police vehicles and parked them on the shoulder of the easement road. I walked down the fence line and to the well site. Chief Mendoza walked through the unlocked 3 4 gate to the edge of the drainage ditch next to the fence line.

13. At that time, I noticed a white compact pickup truck drive from the private property residence and down the driveway to the location where Chief Mendoza was standing. I was approximately fifty feet away from Chief Mendoza. I could see and hear a white male adult, who was later identified to me as Sabalone, begin to yell at Chief Mendoza and ask him if he could read. I then heard this subject tell Chief Mendoza that he did not know or care who he was and that Chief Mendoza's uniform did not frighten him. This subject went on to say that Chief Mendoza was trespassing and if necessary he would have the sheriff come and arrest him.

14. 13 Chief Mendoza was in full police uniform at this time. I walked to the location 14 of Chief Mendoza and the male subject who was still seated in his pickup truck. As I 15 approached, I could hear Chief Mendoza attempting to calm the subject down and explain who 16 he was and why he was at that location. At the time that I reached the two men, I could hear 17 both talking calmly and rationally. I asked the property owner if he agreed the well was not on his property. He agreed. I then asked if the wooden stakes and painted fence post were the 18 19 boundary line to his property, as there was no fence line in that area. The property owner told 20 me that the wooden stakes were survey markers and they were in the proper location of the 21 property line. I then asked the property owner if he was upset about the testing engineers testing the water well. He told me as long as they stayed off of his property, he did not care 22 what they did. 23

Chief Mendoza and the property owner continued their conversation for a period 15. 24 of time. I contacted the testing crew and advised them that I had just talked with the property 25 26 owner and he did not care about their testing process. I directed them to drive their vehicles out the same way they came in. The testing crew understood and agreed. As I was walking back to 27 28 my squad car, I could see that the property owner and Chief Mendoza were still talking

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1	rationally. I further saw Chief Mendoza shake the property owner's hand as they parted. At
2	that point, I left the location.
3	I declare under penalty of perjury under the laws of the State of California that the
4	foregoing is true and correct. Executed this $2/2$ day of March, 2011, in Nice, California.
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
