Ordinance Legalizing the Introduction, ... Sale, or Possession of Intoxicants

NOVEMBER 22, 1974.

In accordance with authonity delegated by the Secretary of the Interior to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs by 230 DM 2, and in accordance with the Act of August 15, 1953, Pub. L. 277, 83rd Congress, 1st Session (67 Stat. 586), I certify that the following ordinance relating to the application of the Federal Indian Liquor Laws on the La Jolla Indian Reservation, California was adopted on March 24, 1974 by the La Jolla Band of Mission Indians which has jurisdiction over the area of Indian Country included in the ordinance reading as follows:

An ordinance to establish regulations and procedures for governing the Control of Indian Liquor on the La Jolla Indian Reservation in compliance with the Federal Indian Liquor Laws.

Whereas, Pub. L. 277 83rd Congress, epproved August 15, 1953 provided that sections 1154, 1166, 3113, 3488 and 3618 Title 18 United States Code, commonly referred to sel to Federal Indian Liquor Laws, thall not apply to any act or transaction within any area of Indian Country provided such act or transaction is in conformity with both the laws of the State in which both act or transaction occurs and with an ordinance duly adopted by the tribe having jurisdiction over such area of Indian Country, certified by the Secretary of the Interior and published in the Federal Recister.

Now therefore be it now resolved that the introduction, sale or possession of intoxicating beverages shall be lawful within the Indian Country under the jurisdiction of the La Jolla Band of Mission Indian, provided that such introduction sale or possession is in conformity with the laws of California.

Be it further resolved that any tribal laws, resolutions or ordinances, heretofore enacted which prohibit this sale, introduction or pussession of intoxicating
beverages are hereby repealed.

WHEREAS,

Public Law 277 83rd Congress, approved August 15, 1953 provided that Sections 1154, 1156, 3113, 3488 and 3618 Title 18 United States Code, commonly referred to as the Federal Indian Liquor Laws, shall not apply to any act or transaction within any area of Indian Country provided such act or transaction is in conformity with both the laws of the State in which both act or transaction occurs and with an ordinance duly adopted by the tribe having jurisdiction over such area of Indian Country, certified by the Secretary of the Interior and published in the Federal Register.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT NOW RESOLVED that the introduction, sale or nossession of intexicating beverages shall be lawful within the Indian Country under the jurisdiction of the La Jolla Band of Mission Indian, provided that such introduction sale or possession is in conformity with the laws of California.

REALTH PRESIDENT PROLVED that any tribal laws, resolutions or ordinances, heretofore enacted which prohibit this sale, introduction or possession of intoxicating beverages are hereby repealed.
