Gentlemen:

Some fifty acres of land in the Litton School District of Sonoma County being unclaimed or unused by the Indians for whom it was purchased has, for several years, been granted to the Salvation Army Boys' and Girls' Home as pasture or hay land. Now, a Mr. Bert Steele, an Indian, claims to have sanction of your department to use the entire fifty acres to settle upon. Is such the case?

I have explained to Mr. Steele that the present crop of oats and vetch was sown by us at considerable expense of time and money and that therefore we should be allowed to take this crop off before relinquishing the land. He is of different opinion, hence, my appeal to your judgment and for decision in the matter.
