Dear Mr Baker:

The Lytton Rancheria, you may know, lay idle and unused from the time it was purchased until the present year. It was purchased for "Landless Indians of California" without designation for any particular group. This year I settled Bert Steel on the place and it is being cultivated for the first time in history.

Now the Geyserville Indians come forward and want to run Steel off the place, saying that Lytton is theirs.

On Friday, February 10, at 3 in the afternoon, I am going to hold a meeting on the Geyserville Rancheria (which we call Dry Creek, it is just east and south from Geyserville) to discuss their land needs. Can you be present? I shall probably be coming down from Alturas; but if I should get in sooner will phone you and we could go up together. This latter is hardly likely, however.
