Dear Mr. Nash:

It never rains, but it pours. One time it is Bert Steele asking about Lytton Rancheria. Next, it is Wesley Meyers. This time it is Meyers. He is once more asking about permission to sell his improvements and move. Again I explained that his moving might forfeit any rights to other land. I did not tell him it would but that it might. But there are many questions in his mind. I can not answer them.

Meyers says he was told to not do anything, after the question of who was eligible to live on the land was raised by the Geyserville Indians. He says he was promised a decision later that he never received. He mas never received any official statement that he is entitled to the land. Under these conditions he feels that he sannot farm or improve the land,

He told me one thing that I did not know before. that Steele had told him he was using too much land last year, and put stakes down through his grain field. A survey, showing divisions would prevent this, of course.

Meyers complaints were so may that I see no advantage of attenting to write them all to you. He says he would like to talk to you personally, but does not want to make the drive into Sacramento without having reasonable assurance of finding you. He says that he would drive in and talk with you if he can have an appointment with you.
