Ily dear "re Commissioner:
The attached option from the Cosimnes Company for the purchase of lots 615, 616, 617, Central Califormia Traction Unit No, 7, Sacramento County, Oalifornia containing 38.77 acres for horeless Indians of California is submitted for your consideration and necessary action. The follovinc is offered in support of same, to wit:

It is found, after careful inquiry, that thirty-three families comprising at least one hundred and fifty homeless Indians reside and procure employment a considerable porition of the year in the vicinity of the proposed option, as shown by the attached list, giving the number of Indians in each family which is believed sufficient to varrant our serious consideration.

For your information and in further justification kindly let it be known that this option is regarded as en unusually good one, and one we should not allow to get away from us. The Indians involved are in great need of a hone site within convenient reach of the market for their labor. They are absolutely homeless and have for many years drifted from place to place securing employment, but having no abode, although their principle employment has been in the vioinity of the land here under consideration.

Further the land under consideration was set away at the time the tract was opened for recreetion grounds and has not been on the market antil now and only because the tract is prectically sold out. It is learned that same was not intended for the market until aiter January 1,1928 , when other interested parties were expected to take an option on a term sale at $\$ 150.00$ per acre or $\$ 5815.50$. This same said fact was brought to our attention through certain Indians of that locality and upon investigation it wes leamed that the Cosumes Company owned it. Negotiations were inmediately entered into and efter considerable time we huve succeeded in obtaining the option, but not until the company was assured of our good faith in the premises and that any gurchase made by us would be cash did they consent to glve us the option. Further after considerable negotiations they agreed to make the consideration for the flat surn of $\$ 5000.00$ (reduction of $\$ 815.15$ ) and also agreed to put dom ard establish a good domestic mell at their expense at any point selected by us.
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Further the tract under consideration is unusually suitable for our purpost, with the exception of thet part covered loy large (very largel oak trees, End is excelbent forming land; the trees of course vill be protected.

This tract is ideally located for the convenience of the Indians it is at the "cross roads" of two important higmays same passing on two siaes. The Central California Traction Company's line between Sacramento and Stockton passes imnediately in front on the South side of the tract and there is a reguler station, post office and tore within one hundred yards of the land, known as Wilton, Californis. There is also a good public school at the same point, which is available for Indian Pupils.

Attention is respoctively invited to the fact that the option is limited to sixty days from November 1, 1927, and ith is feared same may not be extended, unless possibly the deal has advanced to a point where it seems reasonably certain that the same could and would be consumated as soon as title has been found satisfactory and necessary details as to purchase have been accomplished.

This matter, Mr. Commissioner, is regarded as ons of the very best propostions for homeless Indians of California that has been submitted for your consideration and may we prevail upon you to take favorable action. Approval is urgently recommended.

The preliminary report by a Title Insurance Company covering the whole of tract number seven and of which the land under consideration is a part show the Cosumes company are in a position to furnish grood and clear title. The fact that the Title Insurance Policy, for the land here being considered, will cost the Company about 770.00 it has been deemed only feir and proper to not require them to fumish same unless the option has received favorable sanction, \&it appears reasonably certain that the deal would be consumeted if requirements of the Department are met.
